NEWS FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome to term 3 and I must say it's great to be back. Thank you to all of those students and parents who have been very kind with their words. At the moment my 'return to work plan' means on Wednesdays I will work from home, the bulk of this time spent on the school review. Over the next few Wednesdays while I'm away from the school Ms. Sue Duggan and members of the leadership team will be there to assist you and our students. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Ashton Webber for his contribution to our school while I was absent. Thank you also to our leadership team who continually uphold the values that our school stands for.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN results are being sent home today in paper copy via your child. This only applies to grade three and five students. There are many changes to NAPLAN in 2023 and I am writing to inform you of what this may look like. These changes have been introduced nationally by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority or ACARA

NAPLAN will continue to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling and grammar and punctuation but the results will now be presented in four proficiency levels. These are:

- ·Exceeding
- ·Strong
- ·Developing
- ·Needs Additional Support

This change will give schools parents and carers clear information that details student achievement against these proficiency scales.

Students NAPLAN reports will continue to show how they're tracking against their peers and provide an indication of their skill level against national and state averages and where we would expect them to be in order to get the most out of schooling. NAPLAN also provides valuable information to teachers about how we can continue to support children in the classroom.

It is important to note that this is one snapshot of your child's learning. NAPLAN results do not define your children in any way moreover it is one way that we use to provide further support to students who need it. Within your packs you will also find information that further explains the scales and the process used to derive scores.

As ever you are more than welcome to make an appointment to see your child's teacher to discuss the results.

SCHOOL REVIEW

The school review is a major process that all schools undergo every four years. This means that all sections of our school community are consulted. Several of these consultations have taken place over the course of the last term with parents, staff and students. This information is now taken and used by the review panel made up of myself Mrs. Lucy Allsop (Council President), Our review Mr Brian Collins, the area SEIL Mr Rob Juratowich, Ms Sue Duggan and our two challenge partners Mrs. Wil Pryen (PCCC) and one TBA.

This panel after performing its own investigation and inquiry questions will then make recommendations of targets for the school over the next four years. This we will share with our school community hopefully early in term 4.

Reviews are an exciting time for schools in that we get a chance to dig deep into things we may not usually have the time to investigate. This means that improvement targets are rigorous and based in real time, current data. As you can imagine this takes lots of time, at times teachers may be required to attend panel days or partial days. This may mean that teachers are missing for a short period of time from the classroom.

ILLNESS

As I sent out on Tuesday there has been an outbreak of Conjunctivitis across our school. Thankfully it has mainly been confined to the junior area. Our staff and cleaner are deep cleaning the area regularly multiple times a day to try and stop the spread. If your child contracts Conjunctivitis you need to seek medical attention. Children must remain home until symptoms have cleared up. A reminder that soap and water when washing hands is the best defence against any spread. Also encourage children to not touch their mouth or eyes as this is how it is easily spread. Please remember to notify the school if your child is ill for the day.

TARGET 10

Across Victoria schools are asked to promote student attendance. One of our school philosophies Is that 'it is very difficult to teach children who are not here'. We encourage every child to attend as often as possible. Our school target is to have no child with more than 10 days absence for the year. We need your help! Please inform us when your child has a day absent from school or put it on Compass. The department categorise absences where some count against the overall number such as 'parent choice' Whereas others such as 'medical appointments' or educational events do not count against the overall numbers. If you are unsure please contact our office.

SCHOOL OFFICE

Our long-term office assistant Kylie Mitchell finished working with our school on the last day of term. Kylie was an extremely valued member of our staff and we think her for the years of service she has given our community. 

Senior School News

Welcome back to Term 3! What a busy week and a half it has been!

Last week we celebrated NAIDOC Week across the school. Our BER building students were fortunate enough to participate in a variety of learning opportunities that looked at our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history and culture.

The 5/6 students had the opportunity to work with Kane to plan and create some dot paintings as part of our Art classes last week. Students used symbols and painted these using sticks collected from the school grounds.

Many of our reading and writing tasks for the week focused on Indigenous Australians. Students in 5/6J researched current and previous NAIDOC award winners and learnt about their achievements and contributions to their communities and culture. The students found this quite interesting! In Maths, we have been working on developing our thinking and problemsolving skills. We have been doing this through our focus on addition and subtraction. We have also been learning about interesting number facts and tricks that we can use to help us when problem solving.

In Writing, we are focusing on response writing. We have been looking at how to respond to a range of different text types and short clips and episodes. We have integrated this with our NAIDOC work and have been learning about the first weapons used by our Indigenous Australians.

This week we have had some of our leaders participating in the Parliamentary Convention. This has involved students working through online workshops and developing an opinion around the topic: Should a sugar tax be adopted to help tackle adolescent obesity?

This has been a great opportunity for these students to participate in and develop a range of skills.

Last night at yoga, my teacher ended the session with the above little poem. I thought it was too lovely not to share with you all.

It also followed on from a conversation beautifully that I had with a student recently about emotions. I remember learning that we shouldn't label food good or bad as it can potentially lead to poor associations with food and cause eating disorders. I like the idea that we also shouldn't label emotions good or bad.

All emotions are valid and serve a purpose. I was explaining that it is very appropriate to feel sad at times, also angry, frustrated and shy, just as it is appropriate to feel happy, kind and excited etc.

What is important it how we behave with that emotion and if we get stuck for too long somewhere that isn't serving us. If we carry anger for far too long and take it out on the people around us, this isn't going to be for us or those we spend time with. Just like sadness is important, it isn't if we feel sad all the time for a very long time.

Having said that, what this tells us is maybe we need some help, and that's a good thing too.

Kids are great to have these conversations with. They can be innocent in their expression and also remind us of simple things. They also love learning.

The student I chatted with told me that when they feel angry at home, their Mum helps to remind them of things that bring them joy. Then they told me that their Mum was the best Mum.

This certainly bought a smile to my face (a) Maybe it will yours too! Megan

This is to ensure that, in case of an emergency, all staff are aware of student numbers onsite.



Oh wow, how exciting we have filled up our Thumbs Up wall in our hallway with a total of 272 cards for the year. This is a fabulous effort. Students are currently brainstorming ideas in how they would like to celebrate this great occasion as a whole school.

Some fun facts about our whole school positive data so far this year.

- There are currently 372 positive entries that have been recorded and notified to our families
