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

Those students taking individual music lessons with Ben Yarram are showing great enthusiasm and progress in their musical studies. It has been awesome to have Ben integrate into the school community so quickly and smoothly and have these music students increase the musical culture of the school.

P.E has been leaving students a little red faced lately. Mr. Cooper is doing an amazing job of challenging everyone to complete 1km time trials, pushing students to achieve a personal best. Rumour has it, Mr. Cooper is challenging the Foster Primary students to better the Fish Creek Primary students' times!

In Writing, we are all working towards entering a competition that has everyone participating in the Fishy Stories Festival. Students are encouraged to write in any type of style they wish, with the only restrictions being a word limit of 350 words. Maths has had us all looking for how fractions appear in our day-to-day life. A recent brainstorm with the students demonstrated their increased understanding of where equal parts of a whole can be found in our lives; music (rhythm), kitchen (measuring and recipes), food (pizza, apples, chocolate), sport (football, basketball, netball, soccer), school (terms and semesters), cars (petrol), gaming (co-op, splitting tv screens).



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Senior School News.....

In Grade 5/6 we have been working on personal response writing. We watched an episode of First Weapons, a documentary about the weapons used by First Australians for gathering food.

First Weapons - The Returning Boomerang Inessa Dinsbergs

The returning boomerang is a famous indigenous first weapon commonly used for hunting and there is more to it than just throwing a curved piece of wood!

Into the making of the boomerang, a boomerang has a trailing edge and a leading edge. The leading edge of a boomerang arm is more blunt and the trailing edge is sharper, making turbulence when thrown and allowing it to return. When you throw a boomerang you have to flick your wrist to 45-60 degrees for it to return. The drag of the boomerang slows it down so you can catch it without hurting yourself.

She-Oak wood is especially good for making boomerangs, as the wood is light but hard and if you dig down you can sometimes find a curve in the trunk which is perfect for boomerangs! A lot of the time you can also find an old wooden wardrobe or cupboard in garages or backyards and that is great as well. They then cut down the tree and slowly shave down the wood to the shape of the returning boomerang, or even a different type of boomerang.

There is more than one type of boomerang, like the man on the fifty dollar note who made a propeller-like boomerang by sticking two boomerangs together by the bend. He then put it on a stick and spun the stick strong and fast with both his hands, spinning and launching the boomerang. There is also a boomerang called the seven boomerang, used for fighting and hunting.

Boomerangs are used in many techniques for hunting, but one of them is to hunt ducks. The sound of the boomerang spinning through the air sounds like the flapping of wings of a predator bird, scaring the ducks to fly into a net. Have a nice dinner!

Boomerangs are amazing weapons, used for many different things. So it's not a big surprise that they are famous in indigenous history! I have learnt a lot about boomerangs. And a lot about different indigenous weapons as well.



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Senior School News.....

The First Weapons by Maddie Walsh

I watched the first episode of First Weapons, the first episode was about the returning boomerang. Uncle Moogy taught us this.

I learnt that a boomerang has a specific design that allows it to return. The boomerang has a leading edge and a trailing edge which is what makes it return.

We can actually make boomerangs out of anything made out of wood like wardrobes, draws and many more. She-oaks are also a very good material to use because they are very light but hard and you can find them in the perfect shape of a boomerang.

The flick of your wrist throws the boomerang, and should approximately be 45-60 degrees angle. The drag of a boomerang slows it down so that when you catch it you don't hurt yourself.

The boomerangs are used to kill prey, fight and many more things. There are three types of Boomerangs, used for various things. The sound of a boomerang scares ducks because it sounds like another bird so the ducks fly into nets that people set up.

The man on the fifty dollar note named David Unaipon made a propeller out of two boomerangs and a stick he stacked two boomerangs together then he put the boomerangs on the stick and twisted it with all his might then he put the boomerangs on the stick and twisted the stick the boomerangs flew up in the air just like a helicopter propellers.

Boomerangs are an amazing object that aboriginals have created. There are thousands of more weapons that they have created like spears, shields, clubs and so so many more.

FIRST WEAPONS THE RETURNING BOOMERANG by Flynn Garrow

We watched a tv show this week called first weapons(it's weapons Aboriginals used back in the day) Aboriginal people used this for hunting, there are multiple ways to make a boomerang what they used is they would've had a stone axe to cut through the wood. There are multiple trees that are very good to make a boomerang but one of the best if not the best is a tree called Sheoak and if the tree isn't perfectly straight you can dig down and find the root will be curved. But if you find someone who has a wardrobe on the footpath or garage, you can make multiple boomerangs out of the back of it. The boomerang has been around for 10,000 years. The edges are incredibly important when making a boomerang because if the edges are not perfect it most likely won't come back. The edges are called the trailing edge and the leading edge. The edges have to be sharp to hunt but a certain shape for it to come back and because of the boomerangs unique shape, it makes unique wind sounds so back when Aboriginals used to hunt a lot but when they would hunt ducks they would put a net on a tree that would detach pretty easily so then they'd throw the boomerang, and it make sounds of the wing wind of a hawk or eagle so then the duck would fly up into the net the net would fall then they would catch the duck When you throw a boomerang you need your elbow at a 65 degree angle. Also throwing a boomerang is similar to shooting a basketball because it comes off a specific finger.



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Senior School News.....

The boomerang produces drag so you can catch it but if it doesn't you're in trouble and also if you miss catching it might kill you if you go for a chest mark it will impale your chest but drag slows it down it's most likely the drag will work. The reason the boomerang comes back is it's a gyroscope. A gyroscope is a device containing a rapidly spinning wheel or circulating beam of light that is used to detect the deviation of an object from its desired orientation so that is why it comes back.

In the Senior building students have been playing with poetry, making in Maths and camping at Cowes. Thanks again to the parent volunteers who enabled our students to fully enjoy their experiences whilst being supported to try new things in a safe and inclusive environment.


Camp

Maths

Maths lessons this week have focused on understanding fractions. Some students made origami flowers and shared strategies for working out what fraction of their original square of paper was the smallest triangle they folded. Conversations, respectful challenges, drawings, measurement, using previous experience and knowledge, working together, justification of ideas and strategies all get the brain exercising, growing stronger and strengthening Maths understanding.



On Friday the 4th of August Marion and Jane attended a wonderful Professional development day in Ballarat with Jo Boaler and Cathy Williams from Stanford University in the US.

Jo Boaler has been named one of the top eight innovators in Education. Jo has a focus on Growth Mindset and brain research.

Along with about 500 other teachers and leaders, we learnt about the importance of brain connectedness for Maths success and how developing number sense through strategies such as "groupitising" (seeing numbers as groups of numbers- 15 as 7 and 8, or other combinations) is an even greater indicator of further maths success.





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
