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# 2023 Grade Placement

## What is the process for grade placement for 2023?

Teachers spend considerable time making up grades for next year. Every effort is made to create a class which is compatible and equitable based on the professional judgement and knowledge of the staff. Opportunities for building relationships and the sense of belonging underpin the process of allocating students to classes. This complex process has been developed collaboratively with staff and has been reviewed annually.

The process of class placement begins with this information:

1. The first step is inviting parents to write to the Principal with any educational concerns or needs in regard to their child /dren's class placement for 2024. This information must be in writing, addressed to the Principal and received by FRIDAY NOVEMBER 3RD

2. In late October/early November each child nominates three to five students when they are asked:

- Who are the three students you think you can or want to work well with and you would like us to consider being with you in your new class next year?

3. Students write their choices on a proforma and these are photocopied. The original is placed in the student file. Teachers check the file for student nominations and previous parent requests.

4. Then, teachers work individually and in year levels to form classes using the following criteria:

- Each student has one student listed in his or her proforma and if that can't be done, the parents are contacted and the situation is explained to them

- There are groups of like-minded students (i.e. students working at the same level academically)

- Students' social and emotional need are taken into account.

- Students placed with special needs are placed in a supportive group

- Students with behavioural needs (i.e. those who require extra support to access the curriculum) are carefully placed.

- There is a balance of gender

- There is a mix of students from previous classes.

5. Following this step, the parent letters are given to the team leaders, then each letter is placed in the individual student files.

6. Next, the specialist teachers look at class lists and identify an issues they have encountered with students or groups of students.

7. Finally, teachers review the lists a number of times to ensure all criteria are met before finalising classes. The final class lists, along with the parent information, are passed to leadership for input and to deal with confidential issues.

8. On transition day, students will meet their classes and teachers for 2024.

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## Toilets, Taps and Sinks

### Be Respectful
